SWAPPING GAME MONITORING TIPS AT DE HOOP

Topics discussed during a recent knowledge exchange at De Hoop Nature Reserve included the importance of monitoring data for informing management decisions, how to gender assign zebra and bontebok, how to score zebra body condition, the pros and cons of different game count methods, coordination of game monitoring between De Hoop and the neighbouring Overberg Test Range, camera trap placement, and data capture and management.

Useful monitoring tips were swapped between Gamkaberg Nature Reserve's senior field ranger Cornelius Julies and the De Hoop team (Phakamile Zungu, Willem Dowry, David Davids, Gerrit Swanepoel and Kelly Sokoko), and all information was eagerly taken on board by Vrolijkheid student Mihle Mgedle. Information captured during the knowledge exchange will be incorporated into the new De Hoop Cape mountain zebra monitoring protocol by faunal ecologist Marienne de Villiers.

SUCCESSFUL 60TH ANNUAL BERG RIVER CANOE MARATHON

ZERO TOLERANCE FOR ENVIRONMENTAL CRIME

AT GOUKAMMA NATURE RESERVE

During July, two CapeNature law enforcement officers at Goukamma Marine Protected Area, Wayne Meyer and Simphiwe Mapeyi, braved the freezing cold conditions observing poachers through the night in Buffalo Bay. The poachers were apprehended in the

early hours of the morning with assistance from the local SAPS. Four male suspects were taken into custody for possession of abalone, harvesting bait organisms in a marine protected area, harvesting shellfish between sunset and sunrise and exceeding the total accumulative bag limit of fish species.

Among the items seized for court evidence were 67 abalone (Siffies) and 159 fish. A docket has been opened and the suspects were released the following day with a date for a later court appearance.

Goukamma law enforcement officers are cracking down on environmental crime and will continue with similar operations through out the year.

July marks Mandela Month and in celebration thereof, the Hottentots-Holland team, including rangers, conservation assistants, FTE's, quality controllers and students, pulled together to build five dog kennels to donate to the Grabouw Animal Welfare Society (GAWS). GAWS works closely with the Grabouw community and identifies homes where there are animals that do not have shelters, sleeping outside in cold and wet conditions

A small group of the "builders" had the opportunity to personally deliver the dog shelters (kennels) to their new owners. The dogs were clearly very excited with their new homes.

In a second Mandela Day project the Hottentots-Holland team assisted TUFCAT by doing some plot clearing and fencing for their new animal sanctuary in Grabouw. This sanctuary will play an important part in providing a safe place for abused and abandoned animals from the communities. "I am extremely proud of this team, which has now for the third year in a row, participated with open hearts and great enthusiasm bringing a bit of the Madiba magic to the local community". – added Monique Ruthenberg.

WORLD RANGER DAY MADE SPECIAL IN THE OVERBERG

World Ranger Day is celebrated worldwide on 31 July to commemorate rangers killed or injured in the line of duty and to celebrate the work rangers do to protect the planet's natural treasures and cultural heritage. This day allows us to reflect on the courage and sacrifices rangers must make to ensure that the conservation of our biodiversity is conserved for future generations.

This year, special award certificates and branded thermo mugs were given to rangers in all three reserves in the Overberg. It has also become good practice for support staff, such as Quality Control Officers and Conservation Assistants, to assist in ecological duties, therefore, they too were acknowledged. In July, the Walker Bay team held the award ceremony at the African Penguin & Seabird Sanctuary Rehabilitation Centre. Fundraising Manager, Pinkey Ngewu, welcomed everyone and delivered a presentation on the Dyer Island Conservation Trust (DICT). The presentation further elaborated on marine and seabird restoration projects as well

as the positive impact that each project has made on the community. Prior to the presentation, the team enjoyed coffee and cake courtesy of the SEA component's budget and with all proceeds going towards the conservation of penguins.

In line with this year's theme: "Ranger Wellbeing", the bravery and dedication of rangers worldwide were highlighted, with special emphasis placed on the critical role that Walker Bay rangers play in law enforcement to counter poaching around Dyer Island. The day concluded with a tour around the rehabilitation center, demonstrating the function of the volunteer programme.

Overberg Stakeholder Engagement Officer, Phunyuzwa Xhegwana, gave a word of thanks to the facilitator, but mainly to the rangers and further highlighted their contribution towards the successful partnership between CapeNature and DICT. Walker Bay Nature Reserve Manager, Andrae Marais, facilitated the award ceremony and also expressed words of gratitude to the staff in attendance.

TEAMWORK RESULTS IN SUCCESSFUL

#DONTBETRASHY DRIVE

The #DontBeTrashy drive is one of CapeNature's corporate campaigns and includes a series of clean-up events across the Western Cape between 15 and 30 September 2021. The aim of the drive is to create awareness about waste. CapeNature sees itself as part of the solution by collecting as much waste as possible during our clean-up events across the province. Staff has been very busy during this period with numerous clean-up on various beaches and in towns.

On Monday, 21 September 2021, a number of Head Office staff participated in a clean-up event around the building and in the surrounding streets as part of the #DontBeTrashy Drive and in commemoration of National Recycle Week. The objective of the day was to highlight the waste problem and encourage better behaviour in terms of waste management. A second clean-up was arranged the following day at a nearby school in the area namely Woodlands Primary School. CapeNature staff, along with teachers and learners, spent the morning cleaning up in the vicinity of the school area.

In addition to these events, teams from CapeNature, Department of Fisheries, Forestry and the Environment (DFFE), Working for the Coast (WFTC) and members of Velddrift Yacht Club took part in a combined clean-up event which was focused on ecosystem restoration. The clean-up was a big success, with a total of 71 bags filled and collected by the Berg Rivier Municipality.

GENDER MAINSTREAMING AT THE ENTITY

CapeNature has embarked on a gender mainstreaming journey to ensure it meets the objectives of its Gender Mainstreaming Policy approved in August 2020. It is important to note that mainstreaming gender is an organisational change and learning process. To kick start this process, CapeNature has contracted a gender mainstreaming consultant for a three-month period (until the end of November 2021) to work closely with the HR Manager.

A gender mainstreaming working group has been put in place to assist with this work. Currently the group comprises of 16 representatives from Administration and Governance, Eco-Tourism and Access, Biodiversity Capabilities and the four landscapes.

The first meeting of the working group started with this riddle:

"A father and son are in a horrible car accident and both are badly hurt. Both are rushed to separate hospitals. The son has to undergo emergency surgery. The doctor enters the emergency room, looks at the boy, and says, "I can't operate on him! He is my son!"

The gender mainstreaming work over the next few months will include:

- a compilation of relevant documents to support and sustain the gender mainstreaming efforts;
- a participatory gender analysis to provide background and context;
- a work condition assessment to identify opportunities and gaps to better understand the issue and to address gender equality concerns within CapeNature;
- capacity building interventions for the working group and staff in general;
- a review of a pilot group of Protected Area Advisory Committees
 (PAACs) and the engagement process to explore how to promote

gender equality, not only within CapeNature, but also within its stakehold ers, and

 a gender mainstreaming strategy and implementation plan to achieve gender equality.

These interventions will assist CapeNature in evaluating its current status on gender equality and addressing potential barriers. Eventually, the gender mainstreaming strategy and implementation plan will guide the entity in implementing effective initiatives to ensure that measures for gender equality are effectively institutionalised and firmly embedded in the organisational culture and governance structures.

This work is carried out as part of the Improving Management Effectiveness of the Protected Area Network Project financed by the Global Environment Facility (GEF), supported by the United National Development Programme (UNDP) South Africa Country Office and implemented by South African National Parks (SANParks). CapeNature is an implementing partner of this project in the Western Cape.


